## How to determine what a book in the Bible is about

- 1. <u>Read</u> the book! (or a section if it's a big book like Genesis or Isaiah).
- 2. Ask good <u>questions!</u>
- 3. Read the book a <u>second time</u> more closely, actively looking for the <u>answers</u> to those good questions.
- 4. Write down the answers you find. If you can't find the answer, see #5.
- 5. Consult <u>reliable</u> sources (your pastor-teacher(s) are hopefully one of those!)
- 6. Construct a high-level <u>outline</u> of the book (5-7 major sections, one sentence each)
- 7. <u>Summarize</u> the entire book in a paragraph of no more than 3-5 sentences. Then state the <u>MAIN MESSAGE</u> of the book in ONE sentence.

## So....what are some GOOD QUESTIONS to ask?

- 1. What does this book have to say about **the Lord Jesus Christ?** How does it relate to the person, death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ?
- 2. If it is a New Testament book, how does it relate to **the church**, the Body of Christ?
- 3. What words or points are **repeated** in the book?
- 4. What things are said with a particularly **strong emphasis**?
- 5. What topics or messages show up in **several sections** of the book?
- 6. Who is the **author** of the book, and who was the **original audience** for it?
- 7. When was the book written?
- 8. What were the **historical and personal circumstances** that accompanied the writing of this book?
  - a. What were the <u>historical</u> circumstances around the book that contributed to the purpose for its being written?
  - b. What are the <u>personal</u> circumstances of the author, the audience, and/or main characters in the book?
- 9. What **genre** is the book? What are the main features of that genre in the Bible?
- 10. Where does the book **take us**? Where does it start, and where does it end?
- 11. What are the **turning points in** the book? How do you know?
- 12. What are one or more **key verses** in the book?
