The Future of the Church

Overview

We have finally returned to us, today, during the Church Age. What does the Bible say about the future of the church, the body of Christ?

Quite a bit, actually. In preparing for this final installment in our series on the End Times, I reviewed 50 New Testament passages in the gospel of John and the epistles.

That's a lot of verses – many more than I would have guessed before I began my study.

These verses fall into three broad categories:

- 1. The **trends** in these **last days of the church age** are for increasing *darkness*.
- 2. The **hope** for the church is *bright*: **the Rapture.**
- 3. The ages to come the Second Coming (and by implication, the Millennial Reign of Christ), and the Eternal State (the new heavens and new earth, and the New Jerusalem) will be *glorious* for the church.

We are now going to look at some representative verses, two per period.

1 Tim 4:1-5

But the Spirit explicitly says that in later times some will fall away from the faith, paying attention to deceitful spirits and doctrines of demons, 2 by means of the hypocrisy of liars seared in their own conscience as with a branding iron, 3 men who forbid marriage and advocate abstaining from foods which God has created to be gratefully shared in by those who believe and know the truth. 4 For everything created by God is good, and nothing is to be rejected if it is received with gratitude; 5 for it is sanctified by means of the word of God and prayer.

What trends are described in this passage?

2 Tim 3:1-5,13 ; 4:3-4

But realize this, that in the last days difficult times [seasons] will come. 2 For men will be lovers of self, lovers of money, boastful, arrogant, revilers, disobedient to parents, ungrateful, unholy, 3 unloving, irreconcilable, malicious gossips, without self-control, brutal, haters of good, 4 treacherous, reckless, conceited, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God, 5 holding to a form of godliness, although they have denied its power; Avoid such men as these. [note carefully – what does this tell us when these men are on the scene?]

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13 But evil men and impostors will proceed from bad to worse, deceiving and being deceived.

.....

4: 3 For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine; but wanting to have their ears tickled, they will accumulate for themselves teachers in accordance to their own desires, 4 and will turn away their ears from the truth and will turn aside [be turned aside] to myths.

1 Thess 1:9-10

9 For they themselves report about us what kind of a reception we had with you, and how you turned to God from idols to serve a living and true God, 10 and to wait for His Son from heaven, whom He raised from the dead, that is Jesus, who rescues us from the wrath to come.

What does this passage teach us about the timing of the Rapture?

Titus 2:11-14

11 For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation to all men, 12 instructing us to deny ungodliness and worldly desires and to live sensibly, righteously and godly in the present age, 13 looking for the blessed hope and the appearing of the glory of our great God and Savior, Christ Jesus, 14 who gave Himself for us to redeem us from every lawless deed, and to purify for Himself a people for His own possession, zealous for good deeds.

Eph 2:4-7

4 But God, being rich in mercy, because of His great love with which He loved us, 5 even when we were dead in our transgressions, made us alive together with Christ (by grace you have been saved), 6 and raised us up with Him, and seated us with Him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, 7 so that in the ages to come He might show the surpassing riches of His grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus.

What does this passage tell us about the church in the ages to come?

2 Thess 1:5-2:2

5 This is a plain indication of God's righteous judgment so that you will be considered worthy of the kingdom of God, for which indeed you are suffering. 6 For after all it is only just for God to repay with affliction those who afflict you, 7 and to give relief to you who are afflicted and to us as well when the Lord Jesus will be revealed from heaven with His mighty angels in flaming fire, 8 dealing out retribution to those who do not know God and to those who do not obey the gospel of our Lord Jesus. 9 These will pay the penalty of eternal destruction, away from the presence of the Lord and from the glory of His power, 10 when He comes to be glorified in His saints on that day, and to be marveled at among all who have believed — for our testimony to you was believed. 11 To this end also we pray for you always, that our God will count you worthy of your calling, and fulfill every desire for goodness and the work of faith with power, 12 so that the name of our Lord Jesus will be glorified in you, and you in Him, according to the grace of our God and the Lord Jesus Christ.

2:1 Now we request you, brethren, with regard to the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and our gathering together to Him, 2 that you not be quickly shaken from your composure or be disturbed either by a spirit or a message or a letter as if from us, to the effect that the day of the Lord has come.

What does this passage teach us about the future things for the church?

Next time, we will go into the periods in more depth, and then look at some related passages. Keep in mind that we are looking at each of them from <u>the perspective of the church</u>.

This will be important when we consider #3, the ages to come. We have already studied this in detail, but it was from the perspective of Israel and the Gentile nations.
