Teaching Summary: Isaiah 52:13-53:12, part 20

Isaiah 52:13-53:12

The fulfillment of the 4th Servant Song

Let's read our passage one more time: Isaiah 52:13-53:12

The New Testament teachings on the blood of Christ are prefigured in Isaiah 53. The **blood of Christ** witnessed to the fact that *Christ suffered and died on the cross* as the Substitute for sinful man (the human race). He tasted death for everyone (Hebrews 2:9).

We have completed our study of six aspects of the blood of Christ.

1. Substitution	√
2. Expiation	√
3. Propitiation	√
4. Redemption	√
5. Reconciliation	√
6. Justification	√

1. **Substitution:** Christ tasted death for every man (*Hebrews 2:9*). Jesus bore the punishment that was due us for our sins by dying on the cross *in our place*; *Romans 5:6,8*; *1 Peter 2:24*.
2. **Expiation:** the sacrifice of Christ *took away (canceled out)* sin, its guilt, and its penalty, *Hebrews 10:10-14*.
3. **Propitiation:** The blood of Christ – His sacrificial death - *completely satisfied all claims of God's holiness* against sin and sinners, *1 John 2:1-2*; *4:10*.
4. **Redemption:** To redeem means to *rescue* from bondage and set free from slavery by paying the required ransom price. The ransom price or wages for sin is death, *Romans 6:23*. Jesus paid those wages for us.
 - a. Jesus Christ purchased us with His blood. We were redeemed with the blood of Christ, *1 Peter 1:17-21*.
 - b. By His blood, Jesus freed us from the reign of sin and death, *Romans 5:18-21*, *8:2*.
- c. Having been rescued and set free, all the believer's sins have been *forgiven*, *Ephesians 1:7*.
- d.
5. **Reconciliation:** a change in relationship from hostility to harmony and *peace* between two parties.
 - a. *God reconciled us to Himself through the death of His Son*; *Romans 5:10-11*; *2 Corinthians 5:18*. We were reconciled to God while we were His enemies.
 - b. The sacrifice of Christ on the cross brings into God's holy presence guilty sinners whose Substitute has borne their guilt, *1 Peter 3:18*.
 - c. Christ made peace through the blood of His cross, *Colossians 1:20*. Believers have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ *Romans 5:1*. Christ Himself is our peace, *Ephesians 2:14*.
 - d. God reconciled the world to Himself; *2 Corinthians 5:19*; *Colossians 1:20*.

6. **Justification:** *God declares the believing sinner to be righteous in His eyes forever on the ground of the blood of Christ, Romans 3:21-28; 5:9.* God reckons righteous the ungodly man who believes in Christ, because He places him in the full value of the infinite work of Christ on the cross, Romans 4:2-8. Further, God transfers him into the Risen Christ, who becomes his righteousness, 1 Corinthians 1:30-31. God gives him the same *acceptance* before Himself as has Christ, so that the believer is now “the righteousness of God in Christ”. 2 Corinthians 5:21; **Philippians 3:8-9.**

Now read **Isaiah 53:11b** on justification.

To sum up, then:

A. **Christ** is *our substitute*.

B. **Sin** (guilt of and punishment for) was *expiated* by the blood of Christ – His sacrificial death on the cross.

C. **God** has been *propitiated* by the blood of Christ. All of His claims against sin and sinners were satisfied.

D. **Believers** have been *redeemed* (purchased, rescued, set free, and forgiven) by the blood of Christ.

E. **Believers** are *reconciled to God*, have peace with God, through the blood of Christ. He is our peace.

F. A **believer** is *justified* - declared righteous forever by God - *by faith*, on the ground of the blood of Christ.

These are presented here in logical order, not chronological order.

Christ finished the infinite, perfect work when He died on the cross. He died for all men and women. This means that He *secured* the ground or provision of redemption, reconciliation, and justification for all.

Individual people are *brought into the full value* (receive the benefits) of that infinite work when they believe in Christ.

Christ is the Savior of all men (He secured it for all), especially believers (who receive the full benefits of that provision), **1 Timothy 4:10.**
