Title: From Babylon to Jerusalem

Ezra 1:1-11

Cyrus was a Persian king who God compelled to help the Israelites rebuild their temple. Interestingly enough, there's no evidence he was a believer.

When Cyrus came to power, the Jewish temple was in ruins. Babylon put the people of Israel under <u>severe</u> <u>persecution</u> for a period of 70 years.

Jeremiah 29:10-14

Jeremiah 27:1-12

God made it clear he would use Babylon's king to judge Israel

Ezekiel 40:1-4

*this is during the Babylonian persecution

Consider God's sovereignty — the prophet Isaiah predicted this well before Cyrus was alive.

Isaiah 44:24-28

Isaiah 45:1-7, 11-13

Nebuchadnezzar <u>removed</u> certain objects from the house of the Lord and put them in a pagan temple. Cyrus brought those back.

Isaiah predicted a foreign king taking those objects: 2 Kings 20:12-21

2 Chronicles 36:11-21 (Babylonian captivity for 70 years)

2 Chronicles 36:22-23 notes the reign of Cyrus, prophecies of Jeremiah + same details

Since he was king in Persia, Cyrus represented the man from the <u>east</u>: Isaiah 41:1-10 (emphasis on v. 2)

God had long promised via the prophets and psalms that He would re-gather His people in this way.

Psalm 107:1-9

Psalm 136:16-24

Jeremiah 33:1-13

Jeremiah 30:18-20

Remember that God can use <u>anyone</u> for His own purposes. Think of Pharaoh, Pilate, Cyrus, etc.

Remember as we read more about this trek back to Israel the rebuilt temple paled in comparison to the first: Ezra 3:8-13

In the same way that God knew (and knows) his eventual plan for the exiles from Israel, he knows yours.

God can use resources from <u>anywhere</u> on the Earth to accomplish His will, and we should trust in that same as the Israelites of old.
